

## Workshop Track Descriptions

### HOMELAND SECURITY: COMMUNITY POLICING PRINCIPLES FOR EFFECTIVE RESULTS



This group of workshops will cover the application of community policing strategies within a homeland security context. Workshops will highlight community

policing initiatives that can be used by law enforcement to address the ongoing threat of terrorism. Issues such as responding to community fear, developing coordinated response plans with local government agencies and other community stakeholders, allocating resources, and the role of the media in homeland security will be addressed.

### INTEGRITY: BUILDING TRUST AND SHARED RESPONSIBILITY



This track will focus on successful and innovative approaches that can enhance police integrity

and promote mutual respect between law enforcement and citizens. Workshops will address such issues as racial profiling and ethics and will explore such strategies as police-stop data collection and analysis, early intervention systems, and other mechanisms that support creating a culture of integrity within a law enforcement agency.

### TECHNOLOGY: USING IT TO IMPROVE EFFECTIVENESS



Workshops in this track will highlight technology systems that support

community policing at the patrol and command levels, efficient operations, investigative functions, proactive problem analysis, and increased citizen engagement. Key issues in implementing technology, such as the development of information sharing systems, software and hardware selections, and interoperability, will also be addressed.



# Safer Communities

## SCHOOL AND CAMPUS POLICING



Workshops in this track will cover safety issues related to primary and secondary

- schools and campus safety concerns at the college level. This track will showcase approaches to school safety that have been implemented successfully in various jurisdictions throughout the country and will provide valuable information for school administrators, teachers, school resource officers, college and university public safety directors, and others interested in creating safe learning environments.



## PROBLEM-SOLVING STRATEGIES: SUCCESSFUL APPROACHES

Problem-solving is at the core of community policing and

- often relies on models that encourage the detailed

understanding of problems, the careful analysis of potential solutions, implementation of comprehensive responses, and ongoing assessments. This track will allow practitioners to share successful strategies for addressing a range of public safety and quality of life issues.

## PARTNERSHIPS: COMMUNITY SAFETY AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT



This group of workshops will highlight innovative programs based on

effective partnerships between law enforcement and the community. Examples include faith-based partnerships, re-entry programs, community oriented government, volunteers in police service, and mental health programs. This track will also include workshops that focus on engaging citizens through comprehensive media strategies and other communications tools.

## CONTEMPORARY ISSUES IN COMMUNITY POLICING



This track will focus on such contemporary issues as using

technology to improve community safety, mobilizing residents, engaging volunteers in policing, practicing community oriented government, improving accountability, and exploring the future direction and implementation of community policing.




## **U.S. HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL MUSEUM**
